



# What is Public Forum (PF)?

- Originally called Ted
   Turner debate
- Simplistic 2v2
- Speakers alternate for every speech
- Very beginner-friendly
- Arguing for or against a resolution
- Current events
   relating to public policy

# Use evidence & impacts to outweigh the benefits & harms of the opposing side



## **How does Public Forum work?**

- Resolution; one side supporting / one side against (Pro vs Con)
  - **Resolved**: The United States federal government should legalize all illicit drugs.

- **Resolved:** The United States should adopt ranked-choice voting for its federal elections.

- Debate has four stages:
  - <u>Constructives</u>
  - Rebuttals
  - Summary
  - Final Focus
  - Crossfire (bonus)

The topic changes every month or every two months & based on current events

# **Speaking Times**

- Alternating format
- Each debate is only 35 minutes
  - 3 min prep time
- Side and order determined by coin toss

### Who does this event fit?

PF emphasizes the following:

- \*Efficiency\*
- Persuasive speaking
- Research
- Logic
- Crystallization

### Who does this event fit?

#### Advantages:

- Beginner-friendly; intuitive
- More even work distribution
- Judge-accessible
- Focuses on current issues
- Balances research and delivery

#### Disadvantages

- Limited depth of argumentation
- Many inaccurate decisions
- Difficult to master

#### Neutral

- Frequent topic changes
- Less philosophical, more straightforward

# CONGRESS

# **Congress**

- You are roleplaying congressional representatives and debating over whether or not we should pass or fail certain legislation (bills/resolutions)
  - An average Congress room has around 10 or more people in it
  - You address everyone as "Representative [Last Name]"
- You can pick if you want to pass or fail a bill (or aff/neg; aff = pass, neg = fail)
  - A docket with bills written by other schools is sent out by the state's official website every 18
    weeks (so there is a fall docket, which tournaments use from August to December, and
    spring docket, which tournaments use from January to the end of the season)
- Each speech is a max of 3 minutes long and the entire debate consists of aff-neg cycles, starting with an aff speech called the "sponsor"
  - 1 cycle = 1 aff followed by 1 neg
  - "Breaking cycle" when there aren't enough speeches on one side, we will sometimes do
     "aff-neg-neg" instead of "aff-neg-aff" (not good!)

# **Other Congress things**

- NOTE: Each speech will be slightly different (<u>early</u> <u>round</u>-constructives / <u>mid-round</u>-half constructives, half rebuttals / <u>late</u> <u>round</u>-summarizing the round, mostly rebuttals, "crystals")
- There are **questioning blocks** after each speech
  - The first two speeches (the first aff and the first neg) will get four 30-second questioning blocks, the other speeches afterwards will get two 30-second questioning blocks
- There will be a "presiding officer" or a "PO" out of one of the competitors who keeps track of who has done what for equity
- Each round usually lasts anywhere from 2 hours to 3 hours
  - o One bill in a typical room will take around 1-1:30 hours to debate

5		result in implementation of economic policies that harm the disadvantaged,		
6		exacerbate inequality and jeopardize social change; and

9		infrastructure, education, and healthcare; and		
10	WHEREAS,	The inability of governments in developing nations to bring change breeds

13		a unique position to influence IMF policy changes; now, therefore, be it		
14	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled that the United States should advocate for

#### Resolutions: (above)

- We WANT it to happen (stated in the "resolved" section at the bottom); it's an idea rather than a policy
- If you see "WHEREAS" and "RESOLVED", it's a resolution

### **Pros and Cons**

#### **PROS:**

- A wide variety of topics
- Forces you to think on your feet because you don't always get the speech...
- You're by yourself but also not
- Lets you look at both sides of the coin (you sometimes have to flip...)

#### **CONS:**

- The sessions last for hours
- There is a preset "docket" for what pieces of legislation you MUST prepare/debate on
- It's easy to overthink
- You can get screwed over

# LINCOLN DOUGLAS

# What is LD?

- Originated with Abraham
   Lincoln and Stephen Douglas
- 1v1 format
- More philosophical debate
  - Framework
  - Contentions
- Arguing for or against a resolution



# Where does the philosophy come in?

- LD operates with a system of values and value criterions
  - Value: What you think is the most important thing in a round
    - Ex. Justice, Liberty, Security, Quality of Life, Life
  - Value Criterion: How to measure your value
    - Ex. Utilitarianism, minimizing harm, mitigating structural violence

- Resolved: Parents ought to put cameras in their children's study spaces
  - Aff Value: Quality of Life; More supervision -> Better Time-Management -> Better life
  - Neg Value: Privacy; Supervision principle violates privacy which is immoral

# **Speech Times**

- Constructive speech
  - o Aff
  - o Neg
- Cross-examinat ion
- Rebuttals
  - Includes refutation and crystallization

Speech	Time Limit	Purpose
Affirmative Constructive	6 minutes	Present the affirmative case
Negative Cross- Examination	3 minutes	Negative asks questions of the affirmative
Negative Constructive	7 minutes	Present the negative case and refute the affirmative case
Affirmative Cross- Examination	3 minutes	Affirmative asks questions of the negative
First Affirmative Rebuttal	4 minutes	Refute the negative case and rebuild the affirmative case
Negative Rebuttal	6 minutes	Refute the affirmative case, rebuild the negative case, and offer reasons that negative should win the round, commonly referred to as voting issues.
2nd Affirmative Rebuttal	3 minutes	Address negative voting issues and offer reasons for why the affirmative should win.

<sup>\*</sup>Each debater is also entitled to four minutes of prep time during the round.

# **Traditional vs Progressive**

Traditional (<u>Video</u> if you're interested in learning more)

- What a normal person thinks when they think "debate"
- Balance substance and delivery

Progressive (Video if you're interested in learning more)

- Debate is a game; you can do whatever
- Spreading sometimes means giving 10 contentions
- Lots of weird arguments not seen in traditional (i.e. Kritiks, Theory, etc.) more flexible but also complicated

# Advantages vs Disadvantages

#### Good:

- You can do it without a partner (makes you better)
- Shorter than Policy
- Lots of options and creativity

#### Bad:

- You have to do it without a partner (more work)
- Different styles may scare the living daylights out of you

#### Who is it for?

- Loners
- People who like to debate morals as well as specifics
- Everyone with good taste

# WORLD SCHOOLS

### **World Schools**

- Motions They all start with "This House"
  - Ex. This House would fine individuals who do not recycle at home.
- 3 on 3 with teams up to 5
- Each side is called **Proposition** and **Opposition**
- There is a **Reply** speech
- There are **impromptu topics** where you get 45/60 minutes to prep from scratch
- There is no cross-ex, instead there are **points** you can make during the opponent's speech
  - There is protected time on the 1st and last minutes
- No prep Time
- No computers during the round

### **World Schools**

- Special "Opp Block", two opp speeches in a row
- There are multiple resolutions that you need to write
- Reply can be the 1st or 2nd speaker
- Sample Topic from last Year
  - This House Believes that Ai is good for Education

2nd Opposition	8 min	Clash, offer new substantive arguments, defend 1st speaker's points
3rd Proposition	8 min	Clash and Summarize Key Issues
3rd Opposition	8 min	Clash and Summarize Key Issues
Opposition Reply	4 min	Crystallize the round
Proposition Reply 4 min		Crystallize the round

# **Impromptu**

- Impromptu is a form of World schools debate where you make up your case on the spot
  - No computers
  - o Dictionary, Almanac, Encyclopedia
- All 5 team members discuss to make your case written on paper
- They give you your side before you start
- Requires Background knowledge and is fun for creative people
- Topics are generally more universal so everyone knows more about it
  - This House would fine individuals who do not recycle at home.
- Almost always one impromptu round at every tournament

# **World Schools - Pros and Cons**

#### Pros:

- 5 person team
- 3 people talk
- More creative style

#### Cons:

- Less speaking time than individual events
- No computers during round
- No prep time
- A lot of case writing
- Printing cases

# **POLICY**

# **Policy**

- 2 on 2 format
- Is more focused on the "policy" implementation of the resolution
- Is the longest debate format each round takes about 1:40
- 2 sides aff and neg
- Each team has 2 constructives and 2 rebuttals
- Each constructive is 8 mins and each rebuttals 5 mins
- Each team gets 8 minutes of preparation time to prepare for speeches




#### The Structure of a CX Debate

- Constructive Speeches
  - 1AC: 8 Minutes
    - Cross-Examined by 2NC: 3 Minutes
  - 1NC: 8 Minutes
    - Cross-Examined by 1AC: 3 Minutes
  - 2AC: 8 Minutes
    - · Cross-Examined by 1NC: 3 Minutes
  - 2NC: 8 Minutes
    - Cross-Examined by 2AC: 3 Minutes
- Rebuttal Speeches
  - 1NR: 5 Minutes
  - 1AR: 5 Minutes
  - 2NR: 5 Minutes
  - 2AR: 5 Minutes

# How does policy work?

- There are 2 sides aff and neg
- The affirmative comes up with a way to support the resolution chosen for the year, the negatives job is to disprove the affirmative



- Constructive speeches are to introduce new arguments
- Rebuttal speeches are to respond to the arguments your opponents make and extend your own arguments

### **Pros and Cons vs other events**

#### Pros:

- 1 topic throughout the year so you can research it in depth and don't have to worry about restarting all your work
- Has both philosophical and technical arguments and more policy oriented arguments

#### Cons:

- 1 topic might make you get burnt out
- Rounds are long and tournaments can be tiring

# Other reasons to choose policy

- Policy teaches you about the indepth research of various topics and issues
- Can be good for bonding since it's a partnered event that is very reliant on communication
- It builds speaking skills and quick thinking since many quick decisions determine rounds
